### PULASKISCHOLARS

Six winners of the 18th annual \$5,000 Brig. Gen. Casimir Pulaski Scholarships were announced recently by Dr. Stephen Medvec, Chairman Pulaski Scholarship Committee, American Council for Polish Culture (ACPC). A large number of applications (23) were received this year. The scholarship program was initiated 18 years ago as a result of a sizeable endowment by the Conrad R. Walas family with continuing support from the Polonia. Last year, long-time chairman Mr. Marion Winters retired from the committee and his place was taken by Dr. Stephen Medvec. Serving with him on the Pulaski Scholarship Committee for 2018 are Alicia L. Dutka; Deborah M. Majka; Carolyn Meleski; and Peter J. Obst. The exceptional qualities of school work and research plus dedicated community services performed by the applicants made the final selection process quite difficult. The Committee felt that most of the applicants deserved recognition for their outstanding achievements and honestly wished that funding was available that could have allowed for several more awards.

The Pulaski Committee selected the following students for the 2018 Pulaski Scholarships for Advanced Studies grants of \$5,000 each:

#### **Heather Burbick**

A graduate of the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign in Chemical and Biomolecular Engineering, Heather is pursuing a Doctor of Dental Surgery degree at the University of Texas in San Antonio. She has been involved in mission trips to Jamaica and plans to join Dentists Without Borders. Born and raised in the Polish community of Chicago, she is now more engaged with the Hispanic community in San Antonio and works with the homeless there. She abides by the philosophy of Albert Einstein: "Those who have the privilege to know have the duty to act."

### Xenia Sylvia Dylag Murtaugh

Xenia was born and raised in Chicago, IL. She is an MFA candidate at the Mississippi University for Women. She has a Master of Arts in Central and Eastern European Studies from Jagiellonian University and a Bachelor of Arts in English from Loyola University. She assisted in organizing the Jan Karski 2014 Memory and Responsibility Conference at Loyola University. In 2015 she was awarded the Illinois House of Representatives Certificate of Recognition by Representative Robert F. Martwick for "the Vital Role in Organizing and Hosting the 2015 Chicago Catholic Immigrants Conference which focused on the Polish Immigrant Community in Chicago." In 2017 she was one of the recipients of a Polish & Slavic Federal Credit Union Scholarship. She is currently on the editorial staff of *Ponder Review*, and her flash fiction story *Babcia's Old Gold* is forthcoming in issue three of *Mortar Magazine*. She lives with her husband and teaches literature in rural Oregon.

#### Paulina Paw

Born in Kraków, Poland, and a US citizen since 2001, Paulina is a resident of Buffalo, New York who is currently pursuing her Master of Health Science in Physician Assistant Studies at Lock Haven University of Pennsylvania. She also has a Master of Science in Infectious Disease and Global Health from Tufts University in North Grafton, Massachusetts and a Bachelor of Science in Biology from the State University of New York at Genese. Her goal is to work especially with pediatric patients who are inflicted with infectious diseases. Her advisor wrote, "Paulina has great empathy."

#### Alexandra Ewa Rojek

Alexandra is entering her fourth year at the University of California, San Francisco (UCSF) School of Medicine, and plans to pursue an academic career in internal medicine. She received her bachelor's degree cum laude in Chemical and Physical Biology from Harvard University, where her thesis research on cellular stress responses at the University of Chicago not only earned her the Hoopes Prize for outstanding senior theses at Harvard, but also the Henderson Prize, for the most meritorious thesis in biochemical sciences. Her work on this topic has also been published, as a co-author, on two publications in the high-impact journal Cell. As a medical student at UCSF, she has continued to conduct research using natural language processing to understand implicit biases in medical education, and is passionate about medical education and student representation as the vice-president of the medical student body. Her commitment to the Polish community has remained strong throughout this time, with her involvement with the Harvard Club of Poland and as a consultant and mentor for the Ivy Poland Foundation, where she mentors younger Polish students about careers and education in the sciences and medicine.

#### Alexander Styk

Alexander was born in Syracuse, New York of Polish descent and is pursuing a joint graduate degree in Law (JD) and Masters in Business Administration (MBA) at Harvard University to work in city and state government with the goal of making cities more innovative, equal, and efficient places. His undergraduate degree from Dartmouth College was focused on international relations, public policy, and economics. He has performed consulting work in healthcare, aviation, and industrial development. Alexander is a member of the Harvard *Business Law Review*. His advisor wrote, "among others, Alexander has a palpable affection for Poland."

The Pulaski Scholarships for Advanced Studies Committee wishes these six outstanding students continuing success and is confident that they will fully attain their career objectives. The Committee trusts that they will honor their heritage by ultimately remaining close to the Polish community wherever possible during their careers.

### SYRACUSE MAY THIRD EVENTS

On May 3, 2018, the Syracuse Polish Home and Post 14, of the Polish Legion of American Veterans (PLAV) held a joint event in conjunction with the Anniversary of the adoption of Poland's 1791 Constitution. In addition to the annual "3go Maja" ceremony, Post 14 unveiled a bronze plaque commemorating the centennial of the death of its patron, U.S. Army Private Eugeniusz Jablonowski.

The program began at 11 a.m. in Pulaski Park on Park Avenue across from the Basilica of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Welcoming remarks were made by Robert Synakowski, President of the Syracuse Polish Home. Fr. Andrew Baranski, Pastor of the Basilica of the Sacred Heart gave the opening prayer and discussed the May 3rd Constitution. After the Polish flag was raised, members of the choirs of the Basilica of the Sacred Heart sang the *Star* Spangled Banner and the Polish National Anthem, followed by the hymn Witaj Majowa Jutrzenko. Syracuse Mayor Ben Walsh provided the keynote address, followed by brief remarks by State Senator John DeFrancisco and Assemblyman William Magnarelli, who both presented citations to Post 14. Also present were representatives of Congressman John Katko and County Executive Joanne Mahoney, County Legislator Chris Ryan, and members of Syracuse's 174th Attack Wing, N.Y. Air National Guard.

Members of Post 14 began the plaque commemoration

in the Polish Home immediately after the May 3 ceremony. Post 14 historian, Richard Sloma, gave Pvt. Jablonowski's biography. He explained that Eugeniusz and eight other young men of Polish birth all enlisted in the Regular Army, a few of them serving together in Company F of the 9th Infantry Regiment. Jablonowski was killed in battle on July 18, 1918

during the Battle of Soissons and is buried in Oise-Aisne American Cemetery in France. According to Sloma, two of the men who founded the post served with Jablonowski and no doubt had much to do with naming the post.

The plaque dedication was read by Post 14 Commander, Geoffrey Ciereck and the unveiling was performed by descendents of Eugeniusz Jablonowski's siblings. This included not only local family members, E. Robert Czaplick and his sister Marsha Fenocchi, but Dr. Alexander Jablonowski, of Illinois and Krzysztof Zembrzuski and Ewa Przedpelska, who travelled from Poland.

Remarks were made in English by Ewa Przedpelska, the great granddaughter of Pvt. Jablonowski's sister. Closing remarks and a prayer were made by Rev. Thomas Kobuszewski, Pastor of Transfiguration Church. The well-attended event concluded with a reception that included food and drink provided by the Syracuse Polish Home.

The ACPC Vocal Competition Committee has awarded First Prize of \$1,500 to Justine Izewski.

Justine is a fifth year Senior at University of Illinois, double majoring in Vocal Performance and Choral Music Education. She is currently studying with Stephani Springer in Lombard, IL and Stephen Smith at Northwestern University. In September she was a soloist at the 200th anniversary of Kościuszko's death in the Chicago Copernicus Center. She sang "Wieją wciaż Wichry" by Michał Kleofas Ogiński followed by *Rota* by

Feliks Nowowiejski. This past summer and the summer before that she traveled to Italy and studied at Prof. Stone's Scuola Italia Opera program. In this program Justine had the opportunity to work with famous tenor Donald George in his Master Class. Her roles in the program included Zerlina from Don Giovanni (Zerlina's Recitative, Vedrai carino aria, Sestetto, and the duet with Leporello), Cherubino from Le nozze di Figaro (Recitative leading into Voi che sapete, and the aria), Colombina from Pagliacci, and Suzy from La Rondine. In 2016 Justine was cast in UIUC's, Kranert of the Performing Art's, production as "Virtue" in L'incoronazione di Poppea. In August, 2015, she was an invited guest at the Chicago Chopin Society Convention. She premiered a piece by Michał Kleofas Ogiński, "Wieją wciaż Wichry," which follows the tune from the Polonaise Farewell (Pozegnanie Ojczyzny) by Ogiński. Also in 2015, Justine received coaching from Franc D'ambrosio, the world's longest running Phantom from Phantom of the Opera on Broadway, and a former student of famous Tenor Luciano Pavarotti. After Justine finishes her undergraduate studies this year, she hopes to pursue a Master's degree in Voice.

his year's NCSS conference took place at the Moscone West Conference center in San Francisco, November 17-19, 2017. Debbie Majka, Raymond and Cecilia Glembocki attended, representing the

ACPC and Polonia. The exhibit booth was in the International Alley of the convention center. Caria Tomczykowska of the Polish Art and Cultural Foundation of San Francisco and Deacon Chicon visited our exhibit and obtained educational items for their local Polish School and cultural clubs.

After eight years of exhibiting, many friendships were renewed, and new ones were established. It is our purpose to create interest in both Polish historical and cultural subjects. We gained respect by communicating on number of topics, such as: World War II, the Holocaust, Auschwitz, Jan DeRosen and the Wilson/Paderewski 14-points poster. Since it was the year for Poland's celebration of national hero Tadeusz Kościuszko, elementary and high school work and activity books were provided by the Polish Roman Catholic Union of America in Chicago.

Our booth created a congenial atmosphere for browsing and reviewing the materials on hand. Educators were interested in the Customs and Traditions as well as History of Poland books. The history books were provided by the Foreign Ministry Department through the diligent efforts of the Hon. Zygmunt Matynia, Poland's Consul in Washington DC. Earlier, they were distributed by the government of Poland and the Be Not Afraid Center in Kraków during World Youth Day. The Polish Tourist Bureau provided travel books, city maps and the ACPC provided Polish sweets.

Terry Tanzanian of *Aquila Polonica* supplied two each of the following books: 303 Squadron (the Legendary Battle of Britain Fighter Squadron); *The Auschwitz Volunteer: Beyond Bravery* (story of Capt. Witold Pilecki); *The Color of Courage* (World War II diary of Julian Kulski); *Echoes of Tattered Tongues: Memory Unfolded; The Ice Road: An Epic Journey from Stalinist Labor Camp to Freedom; Maps and Shadows* (a novel); *The Mermaid and the Messerschmitt: War Through a Woman's Eyes* 1939-1940; and *Siege* (DVD).

The highlight of the conference was the enthusiasm of the attending educators. They were thrilled with our book selection, leaflets, and handouts on various Polish topics. Many thanks to Barbara Lemecha, Jarosław Golembiowski, Deacon Chicon, Caria Tomczykowska and Debbie Majka for gathering materials and mailing packages.

The cost of this year's conference was higher than in previous years due to ship educational materials to San Francisco. This also affected the flights and hotel accommodations. The Polish Foreign Ministry provided ACPC additional funds to pay for the cost of the booth. ACPC's member organizations and individual members contributed funds, as did the Polish American Congress Charitable Educational Foundation. This help was very much appreciated.

The next, or 98th, conference of the National Council for the Social Studies will be held from November 30 to December 2, 2018 at the Hyatt Regency, in Chicago, IL.

### An Evening of Chopin by Peter Obst

 ${f T}$ his year's concert, organized by the Polish Heritage Society of Philadelphia, took place on March 11 at 2:00 p.m. in the performance hall of Holy Family University in Northeast Philadelphia. The concert celebrated not only the March 1 birthday of the famous composer, but also the 100th Anniversary of Poland's Independence. Hon. Consul for Southeastern Pennsylvania and Concert Chair Deborah "Debbie" Majka greeted the audience which had filled the hall to near-capacity. She introduced Jolanta Kessler-Chojecka, the new First Counselor for Culture, Science and Information at the Polish Embassy in Washington, D.C.

Counselor Chojecka started her assignment on January 11 and was pleased to make her acquaintance with Philadelphia Polonia.

The soloist, Alexei Tartakovsky, was called a thoughtful and serious musician" by the New York Concert Review and praised as one of the most promising talents of his generation. His beautiful sound, profound musicianship, superb technique and exciting artistic approach have thrilled audiences worldwide.

Alexei has performed solo and with orchestras in the United States, Canada, Mexico, Europe, China and Japan at halls that include Amsterdam Concertgebouw, the Warsaw Philharmonic, Yokahama Minato Mirai Hall and Carnegie Hall.

A highlight of his career was his outstanding performance at the 2015 Chopin International Competition in Warsaw where he was a semifinalist. In 2016 he was awarded the French Prize at the Cleveland International Piano Competition. He is also laureate of the James Mottram International Competition (Manchester, UK) and 1st prize winner at the Heida Hermans International Competition in Westport, CT. Additional prizes include: New York Concert Artists International Competition (2011) and 1st, Audience Prize, and prize for best performance of a Russian work at the San Jose International Competition (2012).

The concert feautred a mixed program of Beethoven, Chopin and Stravinsky. At the end, after prolonged applause, Alexei returned to play Chopin's Valse Brilliante

The event was a successful way to celebrate both Chopin's genius and the 100th Anniversary of Poland's rebirth. Polish Heritage Society president Jean Joka, explained the purpose of the organization and invited those present to join in future events. A general meeting, with refreshments, open to all is scheduled for April 22 at the Polish Home in Philadelphia.
