


- 3,376,800 POLISH MEN CONSCRIPTED IN GERMAN, RUSSIA, AUSTRIAN-HUNGARIAN ARMIES
- 1.6-1.8 MILLION PEOPLE FORCIBLY RESETTLED BY RUSSIA & AUSTRIA-HUNGARY
- 300.000 MEN CONSCRIPTED FOR FORCED LABOR BY GERMANS, MAINLY IN NORTHERN AREAS
- 1.08 MILLION POLES KILLED, 870,000 IN THE MILITARY,
 200,000 CIVILIANS
- 2/3 OF THE MILITARY DEATHS WERE BY FAMINE, FROSTBITE AND DISEASE

AFTERMATH: FAMINE IN CENTRAL EUROPE





- SUPERVISE MILK STATIONS & SOUP KITCHENS SERVING AS MANY AS 4,000 CHILDREN PER DAY
- CREATE, MANAGE ORPHANAGES, ADOPTION PROGRAMS
- DISTRIBUTE CLOTHING, SEW NEW CLOTHING
- PROVIDE MEDICAL CARE TO CHILDREN, CONVALESCING SOLDIERS
- TRAIN LOCAL STAFF
- EVACUATE DURING SOVIET INVASION



STORIES OF SERVICE

- ONE NURSE WOULD BE REMEMBERED FOR CRITICIZING THE TRAIN STATION MASTER IN POZNAN FOR DISPLAYING REGIONAL BIAS AGAINST POLES FROM THE RUSSIAN PARTITION, DECLARING THAT ALL OF POLAND WAS NOW UNITED.
- ANNA BADURA OF ROCHESTER, N.Y. GAVE UP A CHANCE TO SEE HER POLISH-AMERICAN HUSBAND IN WARSAW FOR 1ST TIME SINCE HE HAD LEFT 2 YEARS EARLIER TO JOIN HALLER'S ARMY. SHE SAID HER RELIEF WORK ASSIGNMENT IN KALISZ TOOK PRIORITY OVER A REUNION.
- WORK CONTINUED DURING THE POLISH-BOLSHEVIK WAR AND AFTER THE TREATY OF RIGA THAT ENDED IT
 IN MARCH 1921. ONE OF THEIR RANKS WAS SAID TO HAVE DELIVERED SIX BABIES ONE WINTER NIGHT

Children in an orphanage at Brzezany, Eastern Galicia. Galicia (formerly that part of Poland under Austrian rule) has been particularly active in providing shelter for its war orphans. This section of the country alone has 15,000 children in institutions pending their adoption or their ability to support themselves.



A kitchen at Minsk Mazowiecki. In the summer time the children, as far as possible, eat in the open air. To the right is a group of local social workers. In addition to the persons regularly employed in the child relief operation over 14000 volunteers working in 7600 institutions and kitchens located in 3222 towns throughout Poland have given their active assistance in the relief action.








